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BOSTON-AREA HUMANITIES GRANTS AWARDED

Four of the Boston-area grants, totaling \$34,382, were made under the thematic initiative "Liberty and Justice for All" (*LJA*), for projects that explore these fundamental principles in American political life and their interplay, past and present.
